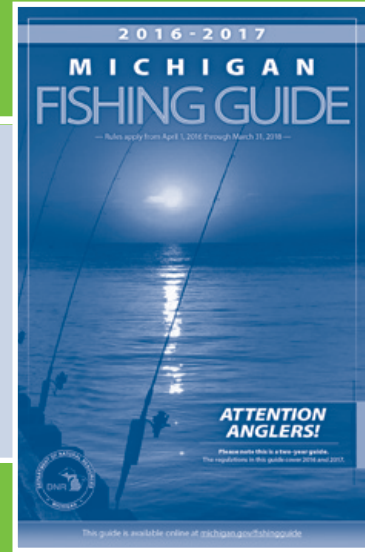
INVASIVE SPECIES: YOU CAN HELP

Boaters and anglers, you can help keep our waters clean and free of invasive species by following some basic guidelines:

- ▶ **CLEAN** boats, trailers and equipment
- ▶ **DRAIN** live wells, bilges and all water
- ▶ **DRY** boats and equipment
- ▶ **DISPOSE** of unwanted bait in the trash

2017 GENERAL HOOK-AND-LINE FISHING SEASON



Largemouth & Smallmouth Bass (Pages 12-13*)

- Catch-and-immediate-release on all waters Open All Year
- Catch-and-keep on all waters, including Great Lakes May 27 – December 31, 2017
- Catch-and-keep on Lake St. Clair & St. Clair & Detroit rivers June 17 – December 31, 2017

Muskellunge (Pages 12, 14*)

- Lower Peninsula Great Lakes Open All Year
- Lower Peninsula inland waters April 29, 2017 – March 15, 2018
- Upper Peninsula Great Lakes, inland waters & St. Marys River March 15, 2017 – May 15, 2018
- Lake St. Clair & St. Clair & Detroit rivers June 3 – December 15, 2017

Northern Pike & Walleye (Pages 12, 14*)

- Lower Peninsula Great Lakes, Lake St. Clair & St. Clair & Detroit rivers Open All Year
- Lower Peninsula inland waters April 29, 2017 – March 15, 2018
- Upper Peninsula Great Lakes, inland waters & St. Marys River May 15, 2017 – March 15, 2018

Salmon & Trout

- Great Lakes, Lake St. Clair, St. Marys River, St. Clair & Detroit rivers Open All Year (Pages 18, 20-21*)
- (Inland) Type 3 & 4 streams and Type B, C, E & F lakes Open All Year (Pages 38-58*)
- (Inland) Type 1 & 2 streams and Type A & D lakes April 29 – September 30, 2017 (Pages 38-58*)

Channel Catfish, Flathead Catfish, Cisco (Lake Herring), Lake Whitefish, Smelt, Sunfishes, White Bass, Yellow Perch & Other Species (Pages 12, 14*)

LIFEJACKET SAFETY

Whether you are enjoying Michigan's waterways for the first time or you've been doing it for years, it is always important to remember to stay safe by staying afloat.

Michigan law requires all watercraft to have appropriately sized personal flotation devices (PFD), also known as lifejackets, for each person on board. Sizes are designed to accommodate individuals based on body weight and chest size.

ADDITIONAL LIFEJACKET REQUIREMENTS:



- ▶ Children less than 6 years of age must wear a Type I or Type II PFD when riding in the open deck area of a boat.
- ▶ Each person less than 12 years of age riding or being towed behind a personal watercraft (jet ski) must wear a Type I or Type II PFD.



- ▶ Each person 12 years of age or older operating, riding on or being towed behind a personal watercraft (jet ski) must wear a Type I, Type II or Type III PFD that is not an inflatable device.

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
